



YOUNG SCHOLAR AWARD

The Young Scholar will:

- have a Ph.D. in Philosophy, a Ph.D. in Political Science or Government, or a J.D.
- not be tenured, or formally under review for tenure, during the academic year in which he or she applies.
- be engaged in research that deals systematically with normative aspects of important legal, political, or other social issues.

Deadline for Applications

All application material must be received by **January 6, 2006.**

Notification Date

Applicants will be notified of the results of the selection process by **March 17, 2006.**

The Cornell Young Scholar award is designed to support and encourage the research of promising junior faculty engaged in the normative analysis of contemporary social issues.

The 2007 Young Scholar will visit the Ithaca campus during the 2006-07 academic year (typically the spring semester) for a weekend of intensive discussion of his or her work with leading scholars from Cornell and other universities. Manuscripts by the Young Scholar are circulated in advance to invited commentators who provide oral and written critique. Further reflection and comment are provided by other scholars invited to join the discussion because of their research interests and expertise. In addition to the expenses of the weekend at Cornell, the Young Scholar receives an award of \$1,500.

Applications must include *3 copies of the following:*

1. One **manuscript article** in preparation for publication; unrevised thesis chapters are not acceptable.
2. A brief **letter** (2-3 pages) outlining the applicant's general plan of research, the submitted article's place in the plan, and additional written work that would be ready and appropriate for discussion during the Young Scholar weekend.
3. A current **curriculum vitae**
4. The names of **three persons** whom the candidate has asked to send letters of reference evaluating the research to the address below. At most one of the three letters may be from a former teacher.

All application material, including the three letters of reference to be sent directly to the EPL Director, must be received by January 6, 2006.
